Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Imagine a society that advanced self-gratification and unrestrained freedom; valued strength, wisdom, and competition; idolized wealth and power. Does any of this seem familiar? Perhaps your mind was drawn to the world in which we live even though I was talking about the city of Corinth some 2000 years ago.

The book of 1 Corinthians was written to a church facing many of the same pressures that the church today faces: the expectation to conform to society's norm, the call to compromise central beliefs, the ridicule and mocking for believing something so 'foolish.' These pressures had made their way into the church and were being accepted as normal practices which was threatening the unity of the believers in Corinth.

There is much that a church like ours, facing similar realities, can learn from an in-depth study of 1 Corinthians. The basic question we will be grappling with over the next 8 months is **"What is the church?"** And more specifically, **"What does a church grounded on Christ look like in the face of pressure to conform and compromise?"**

This letter to the Corinthians encourages a struggling church to remain grounded on Christ while glorifying God with their life. The church is being reminded that it must keep the main thing central—that Jesus is salvation, redemption, hope, and life—everything else must be ordered around the supremacy of this truth.

These are words that we as the church need to be challenged by as we allow the Holy Spirit to shape us into a united people under Christ who are light-bearers in this dark world. As we are challenged, may we also be encouraged with the sure hope of God's love for us in Jesus Christ which binds us to each other and to our God Himself.

May God be glorified in our church and in our lives as we sit under and are shaped by His Word together.

Background to 1 Corinthians

The city of Corinth and its people: Corinth was a cosmopolitan Roman city strategically located on a narrow stretch of land joining Northern and Southern Greece. The city developed into a centre of commerce as it was located on a major North/South trade road and on a portage route as sailors dragged their boats between the Aegean and Ionian seas. This brought people and wealth to the city.

Corinth originally existed as a Greek city before Rome destroyed it in 146 B.C. The strategic geographical location meant that it was reestablished as a city in 44 B.C. and was resettled by soldiers, merchants, and slaves though it soon became an attractive city for immigrants looking to make money with new business ventures.

The bi-annual Isthmian Games, a close parallel to the Olympics, had a tremendous influence on the culture of the city. It drew a wide range of people to the city and drove the economy. Its impact on the city is evident throughout the book of 1 Corinthians.

The 'flavour' of the city can be summarized as "prosperous, cosmopolitan, and religiously pluralistic, accustomed to visits by impressive, traveling public speakers and obsessed with status, self-promotion, and personal rights."¹ This influenced the church, its witness, and its work.

- **Author and Date:** The Apostle Paul (1:1) wrote this letter around AD 55, 2 years after his first visit to the city.
- Literary Genre/Occasion: 1 Corinthians is a letter written by Paul to the church in Corinth. Given the content of the letter, it is believed he wrote in response to a letter he received from someone inside the church about the problems in the church.

Key Themes

<u>Wisdom</u> is presented in a counter-cultural way in that Paul encourages the church to seek Christ and only Christ as opposed to pursuing the ways and pleasures of the world—the things the world proclaims as strengths.

- <u>Unity</u> in the body is perhaps the central theme of this book as all of Paul's arguments exhort the church to live together under Christ. Much of the letter is spent speaking against living in ways that divide human relationships within the church and that divide the church's relationship with God.
- <u>Christ the Foundation</u>: Christ is the key to 1 Corinthians as Paul continually points to Christ in his witness and life. Christ is the model for the church's life together and is its only hope for life. The grace and mercy of God through Jesus is readily present throughout the letter.
- <u>The Glory of God:</u> This is the ultimate aim of the life of the church and everyone in it. Life is to be focused and centred around God and not primarily on self, as it often is.
- **Structure:** There is some debate as to how 1 Corinthians should be ordered as it does not have an easily discernible outline. This is how we will work through the letter:
